THE CURRICULUM

It is the responsibility of the Governors to ensure that a broad and balanced learning experience is provided for all pupils through high quality teaching and learning. Our curriculum provision allows all our pupils to have the opportunities to raise standards in literacy and numeracy and develop their knowledge and skills (including cross-curricular and other wider key skills) in all areas of learning.

5.1 CURRICULAR PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

The Principal and staff made every effort to implement the aims and objectives of the Curriculum and Teaching and Learning Policies to ensure that the curriculum was delivered to all pupils throughout the college.

(Copies of all policies are available on request or can be viewed on the college website).

During their respective departmental meetings and planned professional development opportunities, teachers worked hard to reflect on their pedagogy within the classroom, develop policies, schemes of work and assessment arrangements for their subject departments. In-service courses provided through EA, Teaching & Learning N I, i-Teach and various Examination Awarding Bodies were availed of by teachers to enhance skills and understanding.

The main focus of staff development during 2016/2017 was:

- Continued development, sharing and implementation of the three year CDP.
- On-going work on school improvement developing a whole college approach to Pastoral Policy and Procedures including Safeguarding and E-Safety.
- Existing curricular provision audited and outcomes used to promote school vision and aims.
- Extension of curricular provision at Key Stages 4 & Post 16, in working towards the implementation of the Entitlement Framework.
- Further collaboration through the Magherafelt Learning Partnership (MLP).
- The implementation of the new Capita Network services / "Bring your own" mobile devices at Post 16.
- Effective use of SIMS Data for assessment to track, support and manage pupil needs and support learning.
- Effective use of Performance Data (YELLIS / MiDYiS / ALIS) to identify, support and manage pupil needs and support their learning.
- Establishment of a capacity building programme amongst all the staff to promote Literacy, Numeracy and IT.
- Implementation of various Literacy and Numeracy initiatives.
- N I Curriculum and Assessment Requirements. Reporting levels of progression in the CCS. Communication/Using Number/ICT.
- GCE (AS &A2) / GCSE / BTEC/ OS / ES Specifications Ensuring a broad, balanced and relevant curriculum is provided for all pupils.
- Further development of CEIAG and STEM across the curriculum.
- SENCO Code of Practice / IEP's / IBP's and Gifted and Talented.
- Effective use of self-evaluation to promote and embed Improvement Strategies across all subject Departments.
- Issues relating to the health and welfare of staff and pupils- Staff Welfare, Health & Safety training and Fire Safety training
- Non-Teaching staff training Literacy and Numeracy Training, Epipen Training, and Epilepsy Training.

5.2 SPECIAL EDUCATIONAL NEEDS

There are currently 108 pupils on the Special Needs Register:

Stage 1 20 pupils

Stage 2 29 pupils

Stage 3 5 pupils

Stage 4 0 pupils

Stage 5 54 pupils

During the year pupils were supported by a team of 26 Learning Support Assistants, 26 of whom worked with pupils who are statemented because of learning difficulties. Some of the pupils have:

- MLD,
- A diagnosis of Aspergers Syndrome
- A diagnonsis of ADHD

Other pupils are on the ASD Spectrum and indeed some pupils have a combination of some of the aforementioned conditions. Three members of this group also acted as First Aiders. Two of the team worked with pupils who are statemented because of a physical disability. LTSS support was offered to 8 pupils.

Throughout Key Stage 3, pupils who were identified as having difficulty in Literacy and Numeracy were provided with special support. They were placed in classes where numbers were kept smaller to allow for a greater degree of individual attention. Subject areas were supported through the availability of advice from the SENCO when required. Pupils' progress was continually monitored, through School Reports. IEP's and Annual Review Meetings where appropriate.

In Key Stage 4, pupils studied exam courses within their chosen bands (GCSE, Essential Skills and Occupational Studies). With regard to pupils who hold Statements, the advice given in the Statements was made known to and followed by all teachers. Reviews and transition arrangements were carried out as required. Progress was monitored through school reports, IEP's and Annual Review Meetings where appropriate.

Additional Support

Key Stage 3 pupils engaged with the Learning Support Assistants in Literacy and Numeracy programmes which included the Signature Legacy Programme, the Literacy Club, the Homework Club and the Minecraft Club, 1 to 1 Mentoring for Key Stage 3, 4 and Post 16. Some of our KS3 pupils also engaged with LTSS Support from the Education Authority. The SENCO made use of MidYIS data as a baseline for Year 8 pupils to track progress.

Communication with and involvement of parents in Learning Programmes were important aspects of the provision for pupils with learning difficulties. Individual Education Plans were drawn up for pupils at Stages 2, 3, 4 and 5. Target-setting and reviews were carried out periodically. Individual Education Plans were completed electronically which allowed the Learning Support Assistants a greater input to help set and reach targets for the pupils to whom they were assigned.

Staff briefings and meetings provided opportunities for raising staff awareness regarding the Code of Practice and the implementation and monitoring of IEP's. Weekly briefings enabled the SENCO to communicate relevant information regarding SEN pupils to the team of Learning Support Assistants.

5 REVIEW OF THE YEAR

6.1 <u>DEPARTMENTAL ACTIVITIES</u>

RELIGIOUS STUDIES

It is with great sadness to report the death of our College Chaplain and friend Fr McAnerney who passed away on 15 November 2016. We were truly blessed to have a Chaplain who cared so much about the spiritual welfare of everyone in our college. His calm, relaxed style, his gentle demeanor and kind smile will be greatly missed.



We introduce our pupils to the experience of a Catholic education by fostering their growth in and understanding of the Faith. Our Oratory is used extensively to celebrate various liturgical ceremonies throughout the school year. This year pupils from all year groups were provided with opportunities for extending their learning experiences well beyond the classroom.

Awards

Once again, many of our pupils availed of the opportunity to participate in the Diocesan Faith Awards. These awards encourage our pupils to link school life with their community and parish. Through the Pope John Paul 11 Award, our senior pupils have made important links with Trócaire, Sisters of Mercy Magherafelt and Macmillan Cancer Support. Our Muiredach Cross Award students have established a Prayer Group and produce articles for a notice board encouraging others to reflect on their faith and current events.

Penitential Services

Once again, pupils were given the opportunity during Advent and Lent to take part in penitential services in our school Oratory. The pupils were able to receive the sacrament of Reconciliation in preparation for Christmas and the Easter Ceremonies.

Meditation

All Key Stage 3 classes enjoyed the opportunity to participate in meaningful meditation classes in the school Oratory. The pupils thoroughly enjoyed these classes which helped to develop their understanding of different ways to pray.

BUSINESS STUDIES

The Business Studies department enjoyed another successful year in which pupils were afforded many opportunities to link with the local business community.

Year Group - KS3

- 26 October 2016 Project Business for Year 10 students was hosted by Young Enterprise. This event promotes cross curricular skills such as team working and improving communication skills through group presentations. This event is planned to coincide with the Options programme in the school.
- During Enterprise Week 14 to 18 November 2017 all KS3 students were given the
 opportunity to take part in an 'enterprise quiz'. Prizes were distributed to the
 winners in KS3. Business classes also were spoken to about the topic of
 'Entrepreneurship'.
- Enda Daly, a representative from Workspace gave a talk to Year 11 GCSE Business
 & Communication students on the topic of 'Entrepreneurship' and the possibility of opening their own business in the future.
- 10I took part in the 'Quick Start' programme in conjunction with Young Enterprise.
 This involved them setting up and running their own companies. Mr Paul Fisher
 (Ulster Bank, Magherafelt) was the business mentor assigned. Two of the companies
 were very successful and one of them produced and sold 'Christmas treats' and
 attended Derrychrin (feeder primary school) Christmas concert evening and sold
 their produce including reindeer food.
- 10I as a class attended the Young Enterprise trade fair at St George's market, Belfast on Wednesday 7 December 2016.

- A successful KS3 mini-enterprise group ran in the second term. They held a Easter raffle and altogether between the

Year Group – Yr 11/12

- Occupational Studies group throughout the year educational visits were made to
 the various administration sections of the school including the office, reprographics
 room etc. This involved students learning practical skills through observation and
 actual participation in the use of equipment such as photocopiers etc. This group
 were successfully moderated in this Unit and all students achieved the highest level
 Level 2.
- Friday 2 December 2016 Mrs Johanna Scullion, a Human Resource consultant, spoke with Year 12 GCSE Business Studies students about the topic of Human Resources (from their specification) and also about 'interview skills' etc.

GCSE Revision Classes

Year 12 revision classes took place after school during term 2 covering both units.

<u>Year Group – Year 13</u>

- 26 October 2016 Year 13 Business Studies students mentored at the Year 10 Young Enterprise days outlined above.
- 13 October 2016 Guest Speaker Miss Louise McWilliams Genesis Bakery. This
 talk was focused on Unit 1 of GCE Applied Business which is a compulsory element
 of this unit. The valuable information gained on this day allowed the students to
 access the relevant details required to write their assignment.
- 10 April 2017 the department hosted a collaborative meeting which included Business Studies teachers from Sperrin Integrated College, Rainey Endowed School, Magherafelt High School and St Patrick's College Maghera. The focus of this meeting was to prepare examination stimulus for the students based on the pre-released case study for Unit 3.

<u>Year Group – Year 14</u>

As part of Unit 9 'Enterprise in Practice' both class groups formed a mini-enterprise.

- 16 December 2016 the groups hosted a 'Cinema Day' with tuck shop. Periods 4-6
 Year 8 enjoyed the event which took place in the afternoon. As well as the valuable
 lessons learnt from such a real-life business opportunity, profits were also made.

DRAMA

Performance related events during the year included:

For Open Day, Year 8 pupils practised and performed extracts from *Matilda*. Their performance was showcased as a part of a chat show styled performance called *SPX Chatterbox*. This event allowed a range of pupils from all key stages to showcase a range of skills from presenting to dancing and acting

 In December 2016 Year 11 Drama pupils devised and performed two pieces of Educational Theatre for Year 10. These were based on the themes of Internet Bullying

and Grooming

• KS4 and KS3 audiences enjoyed a number of performances produced by various drama classes this year including; Cirque de La Vie, Beauty and Atrocity, My Mother Said I Never Should and Five Kinds of Silence. These were exam pieces that were performed for in school audiences and also invited audiences including parents and MLP teachers from the other local schools.



• A selection of A Level Pupils, formed and performed as a Dance Troupe, most notably entertaining the whole school with a Halloween Flash Mob in the Canteen.

Speakers/Workshops/Revision

- All Post 16 MLP Performing Arts pupils availed of the opportunity to complete New Era Speech and Drama External Examinations. All pupils achieved a distinction in a range of grades from Grade 7/8. These grades have allowed these pupils to accrue UCAS points.
- Approaching examination/ assessment periods, all examination classes were offered extra revision/support classes and rehearsals
- Year 10 Pupils had the opportunity to attend an SFX make up course, with a local make-up artist from *Doll Face*, experimenting with prosthetics etc.
- Two professional actors on the Queen's Graduates Programme attended SPX and performed the play 'Mojo Mickey Bo' for all examination drama classes. This was an excellent opportunity to see professional practice first hand

Links with other Schools

• Year 13 and 14 pupils studying performing arts this year came from five of the MLP schools. As a culmination of their year's work, both groups performed for their parents and teachers at evening performances of their exam production pieces.

Trips

- Year 13 and 14 pupils attended *The Three Sisters* in The Lyric in November 16 and *Glasgow Girls* in The Mac, in February 17.
- KS3 and KS4 pupils attended a performance of Blood Brothers in The Millennium Forum Derry, in October 16

ENGLISH

- A re-emphasis was placed on literacy across the KS3 curriculum via whole staff
 INSET where a range of currently implemented cross curricular literacy
 strategies/initiatives/projects were presented/explained to instruct/encourage/assist
 middle-managers and teachers to effectively plan for, deliver and monitor the
 transferable core skill of literacy across the KS3 curriculum and beyond.
- Continuation of successful KS4/Post 16 after-school 'Signature Legacy Clinics' across the curriculum.
- Successful launch of Post 16 Personal Statement programme targeting and assisting Year 13 pupils in the successful completion of their pivotal personal statement prior to (hopefully) getting into their course of choice in tertiary education.
- On-going collaborative work with 'Inclusion and Diversity' service and HODs regarding the evolution of current cross-curricular KS3 POS, schemes, units, lessons, assessments to ensure a higher quality of teaching and learning for all 'newcomer' pupils.
- Project 500 (an initiative originally designed to promote literacy in science) in collaboration with Q.U.B., was implemented into the English Department in KS3.
- First placed pupil, Anna McGeown (4th) in the international 'Soroptimist' public-speaking competition.
- In the month of September all Year 8 students took part in 'Presentation Counts', an induction programme for English to focus on writing and discussion skills.
- For Open Day January 2017, Year 8 students encouraged Primary 7 pupils to enhance their creative writing skills using drama strategies, with a focus on character, setting and plot.
- World Book Day was celebrated in March 2017 with DEAR (Drop Everything and Read) in all subject areas.
- Approaching examination periods all Year 11 14 examination classes were offered revision sessions/workshops and attended SEP funded Christmas and Easter Workshops.
- In March 2017 the Year 14 English Literature class enjoyed a workshop in HomePlace, Bellaghy to deepen their knowledge of Heaney's 'Burial at Thebes'.

- In April 2017 the Year 14 English Literature class enjoyed a trip to the Riverside Theatre in Coleraine to watch a performance of their exam text 'Jane Eyre'.

GEOGRAPHY

Pupils had an opportunity throughout the year to participate in a variety of fieldwork activities:

During 28 September – 1 October the Geography department ran a very exciting International Trip to Iceland for Key Stage 4 & Post 16 Geography students. 22 pupils with their teachers Mrs MA Diamond, Mrs Scott and Mrs Rea embarked on this very exciting adventure ascending volcanoes, cascading waterfalls and majestic glaciers. Unforgettable experiences such as the Blue



Lagoon and seeing the dancing Northern Lights by night made this a trip of a lifetime.

- In advance of their trip the students worked as a team with the Geography department managing a fundraiser 'Find the Geyser.'
- On 12 October 2016 our Year 10 pupils had a guided interactive visit of the Giant's Causeway Centre and stones and completed a tourism impact evaluation of the settlement of Portrush.
- In February 2017, Year 8 completed their College Micro-Climate study within the College grounds.
- On the 15 March 2017 our Year 13 pupils had a field study day; they first visited the upper River Roe to participate in fieldwork as part of their AS Fluvial studies, followed by a visit to Portstewart Strand to study dune succession. During the second part of the day they were invited to the Geography department of the University of Ulster, Coleraine to take part in a GIS/remote sensing mapping workshop, where they were praised for their participation by Mr Paul Dunlop UU.
- On the 13 & 14 June 2017 all Year 9 pupils went to Glenshane Forest to take part in an Eco-Orienteering Challenge. Certificates and prizes were awarded for best teams per class. A trophy donated by Moss View Potatoes was presented for the first time to the winning form class, to be engraved and retained in their Geography teacher's classroom.

Collaboration with other departments and schools

 During the week beginning 12 June 2017 the Geography department worked with the Science department to host an Environmental Science Workshop for our feeder Primary School P6 pupils. An interactive workshop looking at our College Conservation Ecosystem.

New initiatives



HISTORY

Educational visit

On 13 March 2017 a group of year 12 and 13 pupils took part in a wonderful trip to

Berlin. They were accompanied by Mr Kelly and Miss Hanson who worked in chorus to ensure that the trip proved to be a fantastic opportunity for pupils to build on classroom learning. They visited Sachenhausen Concentration Camp and explored the Topography of Terror, which was formerly the headquarters of the SS and Gestapo.



The walking tour of Berlin was also highly relevant and allowed pupils to see the key historical sites which had an influence on their curriculum. Sites such as the Brandenburg Gate, the Reichstag and the Berlin Wall were explored. Overall, this was highly successful and saw pupils develop a healthy respect for different historical perspectives. They also gained an insightful understanding of this important time period in history.

HOME ECONOMICS

ACHIEVEMENTS

The Home Economics department was delighted to maintain its high standards. This year CCEA ranked a number of students from St Pius X College as award winners at GCSE and A 'Level. Nicole Scullion achieved second place and Caitlin Doyle achieved third place in GCSE Hospitality. In A 'Level Double Award Health and Social Care, Sara Averell achieved first place and Shannon McElwee was place third. As first place winner in Northern Ireland, Sara was privileged to attend the 'Celebrating Excellence' award ceremony at Stormont. The ceremony celebrated learners who displayed outstanding achievement, dedication and commitment in their CCEA examinations.

LINKS TO BUSINESS

A group of GCSE students had the opportunity to visit the Galgorm Resort and Spa, where they had a guided tour and talk with Ruth Fitzpatrick (Past pupil and Human Resources consultant). The purpose of this visit was to provide the students with an insight into the different departments of a hotel, job roles, the role of conference & banqueting and how the front office links to the other departments. Pupils also got to sample menu items from Gillies Restaurant in preparation for their Controlled Assessment meal.

Our Year 13 BTEC Hospitality pupils visited a range of hospitality outlets to gain an understanding of their organisations, type of ownership and staffing structures. Outlets that the students visited included:

As part of BTEC Hospitality Year 13 and 14 study European and Asian foods, students visited COSMO's in Belfast to conduct taste tests and evaluations of world foods.

We were delighted to have successfully organised our 'St Pius X Christmas Bake off' competition in December. Twenty-five Year 10 pupils entered and produced some excellent baking. Maeve Higgins was the overall winner on the day. Huge congratulations to all who took part.



LINKS WITH OTHER SCHOOLS

We continue to work closely with our local primary schools. This year we welcomed the Primary Five pupils from New Row Primary School, Castledawson to our department for an Easter Cookery Experience.

Spending time in Home Economics and cooking new recipes helped the pupils to develop a positive connection to all different types of foods including fruits and vegetables. Forming a positive experience with fresh foods is so important because healthy foods are the foundation for good nutrition. Children will also learn basic cooking skills that they can use for the rest of their lives.

Cooking with these pupils provided practical experience with many essential skills such as reading, following directions, and measuring. Getting involved in cooking also helped to develop their fine motor skills, eye-hand coordination and concepts of maths and science.

E-LEARNING and ICT EVENTS

Outstanding GCSE and A Level Results:

Students studying CCEA GCSE ICT and GCE Applied ICT achieved 100% Grade A*-C in their GCSE and A Level qualifications. AS results consisted of 15 A Grades and 2 B Grades. A2 results were equally comparable, with 27 students achieving either A*, A or B Grade.

CCEA Top Student:

Eimear McErlane, also achieved A* grade in GCE Applied ICT and gained first place within Northern Ireland. There were over 1500 candidates entered for this course, making this a tremendous achievement for Eimear. Eimear is currently completing BEd (Hons) Post-Primary Religious Studies at St. Mary's University College, Belfast and was awarded the JP McManus scholarship.

Sentinus: Coding and Apps:

In November, Key Stage 3 students completed workshops in coding and app development. Sentinus provided a range of one-to-one opportunities for students to participate in the latest computing trends.

Hour of Code:

- In December, Year 11 GCSE ICT students participated in the "Hour of Code" event in Northern Regional College, Magherafelt. This is the second occasion that our college participated in the worldwide #HourOfCode.
- Hour of Code is a worldwide event, introducing millions of new learners to computer science. Students of all ages can choose from a variety of self-guided tutorials which work on any modern browser, tablet, smartphone, or even with no computer at all. This global initiative involved more than 100 million learners in 196 countries participating in events.
- The NRC organised the event using state of the art applications to inspire over 300 pupils from local schools across the Mid Ulster Area. Additionally, computing students worked together with Level 3 Travel & Tourism students in order to run the tutorials on the day. These tutorials included TouchDevelop, Scratch, App Inventor and Lego Robots. Level 3 Computing students set up a temporary webpage and Twitter account to promote the event.
- Presentations and workshops from external organisations such as Allsate NI, Kainos
 Microsoft took place throughout the day adding value to visiting students and
 keeping them up to date with the latest software and trends. Students from St. Pius
 X College thoroughly enjoyed the event and successfully won many competitions on
 the day. Well done to all concerned.

Safer Internet Day:

Safer Internet Day was celebrated by all students in the college during February in the form of assemblies, ICT resources, competitions and wall displays.

Primary Links:

Mrs McStocker provided e-safety workshops to a number of feeder primary school to raise awareness at KS2 in relation to a number of e-safety issues. The success of this pilot was endorsed by the primary schools involved and this provision will continue to be offered during next academic year.

iPad Training:

Over the course of the academic twenty-five members of staff continued training embracing i-Pad technology in the classroom. iTeach provided training to staff on the innovative use of iPad technology across the curriculum. iTeach staff shared software skills and strategies enhancing engagement within the classroom environment and supporting learning and teaching across arrange of subjects.

Microbit devices:

Year 8 students trialled micro bit devices supplied by BBC. Each pupil received a BBC micro bit, a tiny device that can be coded and customised to produce games and applications. It is hoped the miniature computers will encourage students to be creative with technology and develop skills in STEM related subjects

Safer Internet Day 2017 Competition Winner:

Karolina Grigorjeva, a Year 10 student from St. Pius X College recently won the Safer Internet Day 2017 Competition. This competition was at a national level within the UK Best Secondary School category. This year's theme was 'Be the Change: Unite for a better internet'. Karolina selected the word 'CHANGE' and made the following entry:

Cyberbullying Has Achieved Nothing: Get Educated

Tina Elson, Kodo, "There were thousands of entries from all around the UK. In the last few hours leading up to Safer Internet Day 2017, we had a flurry of entries for the acronym competition - aimed at encouraging students to come up with their own e-safety slogan. The competition generated some great responses - it certainly made judging a challenge. We are now delighted to announce Karolina as the winner".

In St. Pius X College, we strive to ensure pupils and the wider college community are e-savvy. The SID 17 competition this year was brilliant, engaging, thought provoking and most importantly fun! We are very proud of our winning entrant. Her acronym is clever and makes a point about the futility of Cyberbullying. A large number of our pupils were self-motivated into getting actively involved and this for us, endorsed the competition's relevance. Overall, participants were provided with a wonderful opportunity to develop their 21st century thinking skills, problem solving and creativity. This is a tremendous achievement for Karolina. We wish Karolina huge congratulations in the dissemination of her e-safety message to a global audience!

New Specification Developments:

As CCEA are discontinuing GCSE ICT and GCE Applied ICT, the ICT department are currently researching alternative qualifications with CCEA and OCR.

LEARNING FOR LIFE & WORK

The Department of Social Sciences

Another successful year for GCSE LLW with an 83% A*-C pass rate. Sociology was launched as a new Linear A level in 2015 and the first cohort of fifteen pupils completed their exams in the summer of 2017. There was an 80% A*-C pass rate. It is hoped that A Level Sociology will continue to expand over the next few years. From September 2017 The Department of Social Sciences will offer a range of GCSE courses and equivalents including Sociology, Learning for Life and Work, Preparation for Adult Life and the Prince's Trust.

MATHEMATICS

Curriculum

KS4 and Post 16 pupils got the opportunity to avail of a number of revision workshops. After school revision classes and lunch time revision were offered to help facilitate GCSE and A Level examinations. GCSE pupils also received an intense half day revision session in January and May before their modules. All sessions proved very beneficial to those involved.



Clubs

A number of clubs ran this year with the aim to raise Numeracy standards across KS3 and to assist those taking their GCSE Maths.

<u>Maths Mentoring:</u> Year 13 students mentored those in KS3 and KS4 who needed assistance with some aspects of their courses. These students did this over lunchtime and it proved to be very successful.

Minecraft Club: Sixty students from Year 8 and 9 availed of the opportunity to explore the International Space Station through the world of Minecraft on the 26 February as part of NI Science Festival week. Priority was given to those who regularly attend the Lunchtime Minecraft Club. A great day was had by all as we considered life as an astronaut and the ISS itself from a mathematics perspective.

Our Year 8 students also enjoyed the Using Measurement Day where they went on a scavenger hunt in Geography, pond dipping in Biology and fired on castles with a trebuchet in History. In Home Economics they used the sugar smart app, produced scale drawings in Art and measured various lengths, weights and volumes in both Physics and Technology. There were prizes and treats throughout the day before finishing with bingo in the hall and each child receiving a scientific calculator.

<u>Darts Club:</u> Year 9 students got the opportunity to pilot the Darts club. This was organised over lunchtime in Term 1 with the final of the tournament at Christmas

time. Students had to use their mental maths to count their score before playing on. It was a huge success. A whole school competition was then run from March to May.

Events

Using Maths Day

Year 8 had a collapsed timetable and took part in a Using Maths Day within the college. The students were encouraged to apply mathematical knowledge they had gained throughout the year in a variety of subjects across the curriculum. They enjoyed pond-dipping to classify and record data before presenting their findings and participated in numerous experiments to calculate weights, area and volume in Science. In Technology and Home Economics they got an insight into real life measurements and there were little treats to motivate them all along the way. Students mastered their techniques of scale drawing in Art and Design. In History students got the opportunity to work with angles and measuring lengths by using a mini Trebuchet to try to destroy a castle. In Geography they worked out map and OS skills. The day was a great success and students thoroughly enjoyed applying Mathematics to many different tasks. All students were rewarded with a scientific calculator for taking part.

<u>QUB Engineering Event</u> - A unique experience for year 14 Maths and Physics students was hosted by the School of Planning, Architecture and Civil Engineering, Queen's University Belfast. Students got the opportunity to tour Belfast to learn about the engineering in many of Belfast's famous landmarks.

<u>Business Management Trip</u> – Year 13 Maths and Business Studies Students got the opportunity to visit Queens School of Management in January. They were able to look at the various courses on offer.

ICT

The Maths department used these facilities to enhance KS3 teaching and learning. ICT was used effectively to promote mental maths through challenging games. New topics were researched by pupils themselves and presentations were delivered on these topics. Pupils also completed diagnostics tests to check for themselves what level they are at.

MODERN LANGUAGES

GCSE French and Irish

At GCSE Level, 8 pupils studied French and 15 pupils studied Irish for examinations in June 2017.

AS Level Irish

For the first time 2 pupils continued their study of Irish at AS Level at St. Mary's Grammar School through the Magherafelt Learning Partnership.

GCSE, AS & A Level Polish and Russian

Polish examinations at GCSE, AS and A Level were taken by pupils from Years 10, 11, 12 and 14 and a further 4 pupils from Years 11 and 12 entered for GCSE examinations in Russian.

Revision Classes

GCSE revision classes for French and Irish were provided for Year 12 pupils during Terms 2 and 3. These classes were held at lunchtime and after school.

An Ghaeltacht

In July and August 2017 48 pupils from Years 8 - 13 will attend Irish language courses at Coláiste Aoidh Mhic Bhricne, Teileann, Co Donegal. Pupils have received funding from a variety of sources, including:

- the Department of Culture, Arts and Leisure
- Mid Ulster District Council
- Foras na Gaeilge
- GAA clubs

An application was submitted for £5965 from the Líofa Gaeltacht Bursary Scheme (DCAL) on behalf of 25 pupils. 11 pupils benefitted from this scheme, receiving £2590 in total.

Applications have been submitted for £9755 for Regional & Minority Languages Grants from Mid Ulster District Council on behalf of pupils. Awards will be paid once confirmation has been received that the pupils have completed the course. 2 scholarships worth £190 each were received from Foras na Gaeilge.

An information session was held on 20 June for pupils attending the Gaeltacht college and their parents.

European Day of Languages

European Day of Languages 2016 was marked in St. Pius X College on Monday 26 September 2016 when the Year 8 winners of the Euro Quiz were treated to a French breakfast and Year 10 pupils took part in a European-themed table quiz.

On Thursday 29 September 2017 Miss McKee paid a visit to Holy Family Primary School for the P5 quiz.

Competitions

Year 10 pupils participated in the Gael Linn Junior Quiz in Glenavon House Hotel, Cookstown, on Wednesday 19 October 2016. One of our teams won this regional heat and progressed to the Ulster Final on Friday 20 January 2016 in Ashburn Hotel, Lurgan.

On Friday 7 March 2017 a verse speaking competition was held in the college with Year 8 pupils reciting a poem in Irish.

Department Exam Performance

KS4 - GCSE

As a department we are delighted with the GCSE performance. Construction has 78% A*- C and this year St Pius X had its first ever A* in this subject. Technology and Design had similar results with 87% achieving A - C.

Post 16 - B - Tech Construction

100% pass rate from A*- C. As a department we are delighted with the results. Unfortunately, with the change in specification and inclusion of mathematics as a core module we as a department have moved away from this subject with regret.

CAD/CAM

The new laser cutter is now well embedded and its potential recognised by both pupils and staff. As a department we have witnessed the improvement in products and the enthusiasm it generates. The laser cutter has been instrumental in helping us achieve the afore mentioned outstanding KS4 exam results.

6.2 CAREERS EDUCATION INFORMATION AND GUIDANCE (CEIAG)

The aim of Careers Education Information Advice and Guidance (CEIAG) in the college is to help pupils develop their knowledge, understanding, skills and experience of opportunities, to manage their career development, and make relevant informed choices, ensuring successful transition into education, training or employment and to become lifelong learners.

The overall objective of effective CEIAG provision within the college is to enable pupils to become effective career decision makers, empowered to manage their own career development successfully and with due respect and care for their own needs, those of others and of their wider communities.

There are 3 main aims needed to realise this objective.

Aim 1: Self-Awareness and Development - identifying, assessing and developing the skills and qualities necessary to choose and implement an appropriate career plan.

Aim 2: Career Exploration - acquiring and evaluating information, and reviewing experiences to identify and investigate appropriate career pathways and learning opportunities in education, training and employment, locally, nationally and internationally.

Aim 3: Career Management - developing skills in career planning, and employing effective career decision-making strategies to manage transition and make suitable career development choices, with the appropriate support, advice and guidance.

Formal careers guidance begins in Year 10 when pupils select their subjects for GCSE. The careers teacher, parents, subject and form teachers are all involved in assisting the pupils to assess their ability in particular subjects and to see the implications of subject choices for subsequent career opportunities.

In Year 11 all pupils undergo preparation for work experience. This takes place in term 1 of Year 12. This is a very beneficial programme as pupils return to school highly motivated to succeed in their GCSE examinations.

In Year 12 all pupils complete mock interviews in order to improve interview skills and enhance career prospects. Pupils are also actively involved in decision making either in the context of A/AS Level subject choices or in selecting Further Education courses.

In Years 13 and 14 pupils undertake a programme which focuses on self-development, career exploration and career management. Throughout the programme pupils are involved in careers guidance interviews, work placements, mock interviews, university visits and talks from visiting speakers.

Extensive use is made of Computer Assisted Learning through Computer Information programmes and World Wide Web, which gives up-to-date information on careers, courses and universities.

In Year 13 a more focused work placement is organised. At this stage pupils have a clearer idea of their vocational pathway.

In Year 14 particular attention is paid to both the online UCAS "Apply" System and direct entry for university applications with all pupils receiving detailed instructions and assistance.

Pupils are also informed of up-to-date information regarding student finance, bursaries and scholarships which are available to them.

Post 'A' level counselling is available in the school following the pupils receiving their results in August.

Careers Advisers from the Careers Service for Northern Ireland come to the college on a regular basis and participate in the delivery of the programme throughout all Key Stages.

6.3 SPORTS REVIEW

The aim of physical education and sport is to promote the physical, health, social and psychological development of all pupils. The PE curriculum and programmes for sport, games and competitions aim to:

- Make pupils aware of the benefits for them in terms of healthy life-styles and physical well-being
- Develop sports skills
- Develop an awareness of team work
- Develop self-discipline

This year we continued with our "Sports Science and the Active Leisure Industry" course. We have a further 5 pupils in our AS course and 2 students who opted to attend MHS to complete OCR Level 3 Sport.

The sports facilities of the college were fully used throughout the year. We also made use of the facilities offered by the local council in particular Meadowbank Sports Arena, golf course and all-weather pitches. We made use of various football pitches in the local community. We were delighted to share our excellent facilities during the year.

Magherafelt Rossa's used our Sports Hall and pitches for under age training and the Titans Basketball Club also availed of our Sports Hall. The local Irish dancing school also use our facilities on a weekly basis.



In addition to the compulsory physical education curriculum a wide range of games, competitions and sporting activities for both boys and girls was provided during 2016/2017. The range of sports activities and experiences included Aerobics, Athletics, Basketball, Camogie, Cross-country, Circuit training, Gaelic football, Gymnastics, Health-related fitness, Rugby, Soccer, Swimming, Table tennis, Unihoc, Badminton, Boxfit, Rounders and Volleyball.

Throughout the year pupils enjoyed and benefited from additional support for a range of activities.

Our Active Community coach worked with our students during January and February, this was a council initiative to promote activity levels among girls. Ruth Brown facilitated a circuit training class after school, it was very successful with girls of all ages attending. We also took part in Boxfit, again the emphasis was on

promotion of activity among girls. They worked with our Year 12 girls during their PE class every other week in November and December.

We also had numerous students on placement throughout the Year, former past pupil Sinead Conlon and Danny Tallon worked part time in the PE Department as part of their Sports Science course and the Sports Outreach programme.



They delivered the "Fit forLife" programme in our local primary schools. Paul Mc Atamney completed an 8 week placement from St Mary's University as part of his BEd Liberal Arts degree. Enda Muldoon continued to support the development of Gaelic football within the College and worked both after school and during curriculum time with both girls and boys.

ECO SCHOOLS

St Pius X College has an active Eco-School committee. They have been involved in a number of projects in meeting the Green Flag targets. A number of duplex, double sided printers have been purchased to help reduce the quantity of paper and general waste consumed within the college. The college also participates in the annual Magherafelt Spring Clean which is run by Magherafelt District Council. Biodiversity in the college is supported by an active conservation area, complete with a pond and gardening club. Links with feeder primary schools have been formed through Virtual Learning Environments within the community. Additionally, bird boxes, hedgehog boxes, bat boxes, a bug hotel and a wild flower garden have been designed by pupils and sited in appropriate areas.

Pupils take the responsibility of completing 'blue bin' recycling each week in the college. Senior management in the college took the unique step in March 2010 of transferring the 'black bin' waste contract to Recyco Waste, an environmentally safe company that recycles waste into solid recovered fuel. The actual flag pole was kindly sponsored by Recyco Waste. Printer ink cartridges, mobile phones and even clothing are recycled in the college. Camara, a charitable organisation also assisted in the transport of redundant computers to developing educational communities in Africa. ICT opportunities are fully exploited as pupils take responsibility for maintaining the Eco-Schools notice-board and website. Pupils have also developed the College Eco-Code, which is embedded into action through inclusion in the homework diary and it is prominently displayed in all classrooms.

In June 2014 the Green Flag was renewed. Judges were highly impressed with the enthusiastic commitment to environmental issues by the eco committee in the college.

6.4 EXTRA CURRICULAR ACTIVITIES AND INITIATIVES

St Pius X College aims to provide for its pupils physical, social and personal development through the provision of a variety of activities, both time-tabled and extra-curricular. The academic curriculum of the college is, therefore, enriched by a varied programme of sports and activities designed to allow pupils to mix with friends and colleagues from other year groups and provide them with the skills and experiences that will enable them to be confident and positive contributors to society. Our extra-curricular activities were greatly enhanced during the year to help extend learning opportunities for our pupils. HEALTHY SCHOOLS

In the College, we have an ongoing commitment and attitude for success in relation to healthy lifestyles. This academic year saw a lot of progress and hard work applied across the board. Stronger messages and pupil contact here was a key priority and I am confident that the focus and energy our staff are bringing to the college will see an excellent improvement this year again to helping pupils understand the importance of healthy lifestyles.

2016/17 was another busy year for health promotion in the college as we provided stimulating challenges for all our pupils through a wide range of physical, academic, social and community activities.

Delivering Social Change Shared Education Project
